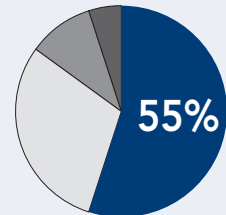

Israel and Global Fund

Strengthening Israel by advancing social justice and equal opportunity; providing for Jews in need worldwide.

Examples:

Preventing poverty through job training and employment

- Olim B'Yachad: A comprehensive program that addresses lack of opportunity faced by Ethiopian Israeli university graduates, helping them get good jobs and become role models in their community.

Promoting Jewish identity and pluralism

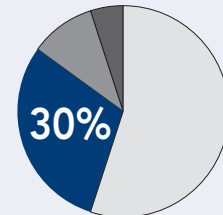
- Gvanim: A ground-breaking leadership initiative that strengthens the connection between secular and religious Israelis; giving participants the tools they need to become agents for change.

Narrowing gaps and encouraging excellence among disadvantaged populations

- ECHAD Early Childhood Education & Achievement in the Arab-Israeli Community: A partnership of nonprofits and Israeli government to prevent poverty through early childhood education, reaching 17,000 children and 6,000 parents.

Providing for Jews in need world-wide

- Partnering with the JDC to provide humanitarian relief to Jews in more than 70 countries.
- Revitalizing Jewish life in Budapest through the Leadership Development program which connects Jews with their heritage.



Bay Area Initiatives Fund

Addressing local community wide challenges through targeted initiatives.

Examples:

Reducing barriers and increasing participation in Jewish life

- Affordability Project: Providing more than \$1M in Jewish school and camp scholarships.
- Special Needs Initiative: Helping 47 Bay Area Jewish organizations become more accessible to over 6,000 special needs children and their families.

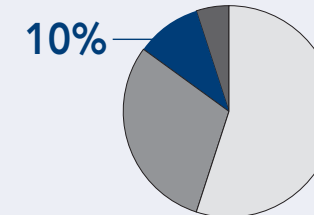
- Our Early Childhood Education Initiative (ECEI): Increasing the quality of our preschool programs, developing the next generation of Jewish educators, building the Jewish identity of our children (e.g., PJ Library program) and making this vital entry point more accessible for interfaith and other potentially marginalized families.

Bay Area Service Network

- Connecting Bay Area Jews to a compelling menu of meaningful service opportunities that will make a significant impact on community needs, and deepen engagement in the Jewish community.

Regional Impact Grants

- A new model for regional grant making focused on local challenges and designed to re-invigorate the important role of the Federation throughout our service area.



Innovation Fund

Seed-funding innovative projects in emerging and traditional Jewish organizations.

Examples:

Next generation engagement

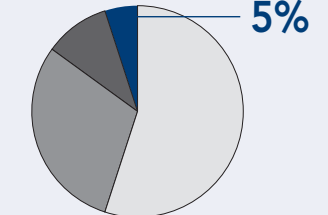
- Moishe House: Providing meaningful Jewish experiences for young adults in the Bay Area by supporting leaders in their 20s as they create vibrant, home-based Jewish communities.

Education

- Kevah: A grass roots Jewish learning movement through a network of 36 Torah study groups that build Jewish identity. The program enables adults to explore the spiritual and intellectual richness of the Jewish textual tradition in a comfortable setting regardless of background, knowledge or level of ritual observance.

Culture

- Hazon California Ride and Jewish Environmental Initiative: Creating connections through shared causes. Utilizes outdoor, environmental and food education to create healthy, sustainable Jewish communities and foster Jewish leaders.
